The Parish Council met virtually using Zoom.

52/20 **DECLARATIONS OF PECUNIARY AND NON-PECUNIARY INTERESTS** – There were no declarations of interest.

53/20 **MINUTES OF PREVIOUS MEETING – Resolved** – That the minutes of the meeting of the Council held on Wednesday 26 August 2020 should be confirmed as a correct record and signed at a later date by the Chair.

54/20 **PUBLIC PARTICIPATION-** There were no members of the public present.

55/20 **CLERK UPDATE** – The Clerk shared a map showing the flood zones within the Parish and agreed to circulate hard copies to Councillors. There had been no interest in the Parish Councillor Vacancy following social media advertising, and it was agreed to continue to promote and review following Covid-19 restrictions. The Village Hall had received a wind farm grant and had so had no immediate financial concerns due to Covid-19. The bonfire night event had been cancelled, but there were plans to site a Christmas tree at the front of the Hall. This had also been discussed by the Parish Council, and so the Clerk had suggested that the Village Hall Committee submit a grant for consideration for some of the costs.

56/20 **PARISH COUNCILLOR UPATE** – There were no updates not already covered on the agenda.

57/20 **WARD COUNCILLOR UPDATE** – There were no Ward Councillor updates.

**59/20 TO CONSIDER PLANNING APPLICATION FOR ERECTION OF A DUAL-PITCHED TILED ROOF OVER EXISTING CONSERVATORY TO REPLACE EXISTING GLASS ROOF AND EXTEND ROOF OVER EXISTING VOID TO INFILL BETWEEN EXTENSION AND MAIN DWELLING (RETROSPECTIVE), THE VILLA STATION ROAD – Resolved –** That the Clerk should advise ERYC that the Parish Council supported the planning application.

**60/20 ALLOTMENT GARDENS MEETING WITH ERYC ESTATES AND VALUATION TEAM –** A resident had requested permission from the Parish Council to use land adjacent to the allotments. It was not clear from the Parish Council’s deeds whether the land belonged to the Parish Council or East Riding of Yorkshire Council, and so a site meeting had been held with ERYC Estates and Valuation team, the Clerk and Councillors Collins and Yarrow to review. It had been agreed at the site meeting that the land belonged to the Parish Council.

**Resolved -** That consideration would be given to allowing use of the land under license at the next Parish Council Meeting.

**61/20 FEEDBACK ON PUBLIC RIGHT OF WAY TRAINING – Resolved –** i) That this update, and the subsequent debate on public rights of way in the area, required a physical meeting of the Parish Council ii) That the Clerk would arrange a meeting at the Village Hall once COVID safe risk assessments had been agreed with the Village Hall Committee and iii) the Clerk would discuss the potential of submitting a joint application to the Goole Fields Wind Farm for equipment which would allow hybrid physical and electronic meetings at the Village Hall.

**62/20 TO REVIEW THE 4 YEAR DEFIBRILLATOR MAINTENANCE CONTRACT AND ONGOING VETS MEMEBERSHIP –** The maintenance contract for the two Parish defibrillators had expired, and consideration was given on whether to renew the contract, or to purchase replacement consumables as required. The maintenance contract was more expensive, although the cheapest of other maintenance providers considered, but the Parish Council agreed that it provided the additional assurance needed for life saving equipment. The Village Emergency Telephone Scheme was also due to renewal. The Parish Council did not consider that the scheme was particularly effective as it relied solely on landline telephones.

**Resolved –** i) that the Parish Council would renew the 4 year maintenance contract with Community Heartbeat Trust and ii) enquire whether the VETS scheme allowed mobile phones before consideration was given to renewing.

63/20 **HIGHWAYS, DRAINS AND DYKES**– A resident had reported the condition of the road to Metham. The Parish Council considered that the road was similar standard to others in the area.

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## 2. Crime issues of particular note

The following list shows some of the crimes that have occurred in the previous month in your area.

- GPS systems were stolen from 3 tractors at a farm near Hotham.
- A Secure property in Holme Upon Spalding Moor was broken into and searched (the rear patio door was damaged).

## 4. Crime Reduction Advice

### Distraction Burglars

### Not sure? – Don't open the door!

A distraction Burglar is someone who gains access to your property by distracting or tricking their way in to steal cash or valuables. This can include people, who are trying to sell items on your doorstep, to those who claim to be representing a company or charity to gain entry into homes before stealing items whilst the occupants are distracted.

When someone calls at your door follow these simple steps to help protect yourself and your home.

- Keep your front and back doors locked at all times, even when at home.
- Before you answer the door, stop and think if you are expecting anyone and ensure that no rear/side doors and windows have been left insecure. It may be that the caller is trying to distract you while someone else sneaks in.
- If you decide to open the door, put the door chain or bar on first and keep it on while you are talking to the person on the doorstep. Some bogus callers call on older and vulnerable people saying they need help urgently. They may ask you to help them outside the house or ask to come in to make a phone call or have a glass of water. Only go to help them if you have someone else with you. Don't worry if you choose not to help it is not rude or unfriendly.
- If someone who looks official calls at your door, always do the following. Ask for and carefully check their identity card, even if they have a prearranged appointment (all genuine callers will carry one). Do they look like the person on the card? Is the name the same one as that on your letter? Close the door while you do this. If you are not expecting them and they have not shown you an identity card, do not let them in until you have checked that the caller is genuine. If you are going to ring the company the caller claims to be from, don't rely on a number provided by them, you could be ringing an accomplice sat in the van outside - (you can normally find a contact number on your utility bill or from the telephone directory).



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- If you think the caller is genuine, but you would rather have a friend or relative with you, ask the caller to rearrange to a time when you are not on your own. Don't agree to any work or sign anything on the spot. Do not be pressured into having any work carried out. Never pay cash up front and never go to the bank or cash point with a trader.

Doorstep crime isn't common, but it can have a long-lasting impact on victims' lives. Remember if you're not sure of a caller, don't open the door – but do give us a ring. You can call us on 101. But please always call 999 in an emergency or if you suspect a crime is in progress.

We would also appeal to everyone with elderly or vulnerable relatives to take 5 minutes today and share our advice. By sparing this time you could help keep your loved ones safe and prevent unscrupulous criminals conning them out of money or property.

## 5. News and Appeals

### Operation Galileo.

Operation Galileo is about the wildlife crime committed through Hare coursing where people usually from outside the area come into the Humberside Police area and bring dogs usually of the greyhound, Whippet and Suliki type breeds to chase and catch Hares on farmland. These people do not have permission to be on the land and they usually bring 4X4 type vehicles and drive over the land causing potential damage to crops. The use of dogs to capture and kill wildlife is an offence.

At this time of year it is prime time for the coursers to come to our flat lands. Please, if you see any coursing going on ring the Police on 101 if it is safe to do so.

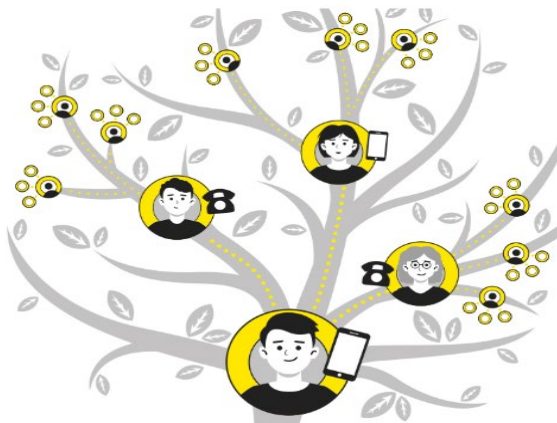
### The Calling Tree Campaign

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## 2. Crime issues of particular note

The following list shows some of the crimes that have occurred in the previous month in your area.

- A secure outbuilding of a property in Spaldington was broken into and a secure ride on lawn mower and quad bike stolen.

## 4. Crime Reduction Advice

### Be prepared for winter.

With winter on its way and the evenings starting to get darker, please consider the below and be prepared!

### 1. Your home

Don't let a burglar think that no one is at home. Always leave a light on in more than one room, eg a bedroom, kitchen or lounge and consider leaving a radio on too.

Keep valuables out of sight and don't leave them where they can be seen through a window (if you conceal valuables in your home, avoid obvious hiding places such as your sock drawer or in a fake food can in the kitchen – burglars are wise to this trick.)

Use timer switches so that the lights come on as it starts to get dark especially if you are at work or going to be out all day. Change the times on the switches so that the lights come on at different times to create the illusion that someone is moving around inside the house.

Consider installing outside sensor lights that are activated by movement, especially at the back of your property or dusk to dawn lighting that comes on automatically as it gets dark.

Ensure all doors and windows are locked and that no keys are left in doors or window locks.

Secure your garden with a fence and a lockable gate and don't leave tools or ladders in the garden which may assist a burglar.

To assist the police in recovering and returning stolen property, people should register valuables onto [www.Immobilise.com](http://www.Immobilise.com). Cycles, golf and fishing equipment and tools can be easily added onto the property register and then this assists the force in identifying property as stolen/lost, bring offenders to justice and stop the items being sold via second hand stores. The system can also allow owners to upload pictures of unique items.



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## 2. Your Car

Make sure you check your lights before you set out in case a bulb has blown. (You might even consider carrying a spare light bulb or two)

Make sure your window washer is full of water and screen wash and that there is anti-freeze in your radiator.

Check the tyres. Have they got a decent amount of tread on them and are they at the correct pressure? If in doubt, get them checked.

Are your registration plates and car lights clean or do they need a wash?

Think about what you might need if you break down in the cold. Is there a blanket or a torch in the car? Consider having a mobile phone with you too.

Do not leave any valuables in your car eg a satnav or dash cam (remember to remove the cradle and any lasting sucker marks on the windscreen)

Never leave your keys in the ignition: a prime example is when paying for petrol or warming your car on an icy morning.

When leaving your vehicle parked, consider that although it might be still be daylight, think about night time lighting and how remote the location may become. Busy, overlooked or CCTV-monitored parking areas are far safer than deserted side streets

## 5. News and Appeals

**Warning following recent farming GPS thefts** -We are warning farmers across the East Riding to be vigilant following a recent spate of thefts from farms. Several farm vehicles have been targeted and their GPS systems have been stolen. GPS systems are essential for farmers and losing them, and the information they hold, can have a considerable effect on farm businesses, let alone the huge cost to replace the stolen items.

We would advise farmers to remove these units from their tractors and other farm machinery each night. Don't leave them in a locked cab, as these can be broken into. We would also ask farmers to consider using property marking kits as an added security measure.
